To Begin: Find a Bible. If safe, perhaps light a candle. Find a comfortable place and read prayerfully through the service. If you have access to worship music, choose a song and listen to it as you begin or read; or even sing, the modern song from this Sunday's Service set out below.

Thank you that you come to us in love and through the cross of Christ offer us forgiveness. And thank you that you come to us in the power of the Holy Spirit to equip us for your service. Help us to hear your word today and put it into practice. **Amen**

Read: Luke 5:1-11.

What's Our Raw Material? (A summary of the talk given by Howard Wright).

Today, Jesus invites, Simon, his colleagues, and the crowd, including us, to be his apprentices and join in.

begins with It listening. Simon listens to Jesus. When telling parables. Jesus would use the expression, 'If you have ears to hear, hear!' He is



saying, come on guys, you have ears, so listen – hear with your ears, your minds, and hearts.

Jesus concludes the sermon on the mount with a story about hearing: Read, Matthew 7:24-27.

Simon listened and he acted upon what he heard.

Simon had been fishing all night. Fish in a lake typically feed in the shallows at night, during the day they retreat well out of sight and out of reach, into the deeper darker water. Simon was a professional fisherman, and probably a good one, he had his own boat and business partners. Simon knew about fish but this last night he has caught nothing. He is fed up, hungry with no food and nothing to sell, tired and ready for bed, but he needs to tidy up and prep before heading home. So, he is sat fixing his nets ready for the next shift. But he listens...

How is our listening? Apprentices of Jesus listen to Jesus. Simon had all the necessary excuses to pay no attention to Jesus, but he did anyway.

In the story Mary and Martha in Luke 10, Martha seems rightly to be concerned about all the necessary jobs she must do for the arrival of visitors including Jesus. Mary, Martha's sister, does nothing, nothing at all the lazy so-and-so! But Jesus sides with Mary. Martha, he says, 'you are worried and upset by many things but only one is needed.' Mary was not 'doing nothing', she was listening!

Jesus modelled this himself. He was the actual Messiah, the only person the world has ever actually needed, the only truly indispensable person who could save the world. Yet, he does not rush around solving all the problems. He takes time out to pray, often alone at night. His priority is listening to his Father with his ears, mind, and heart. Listening and acting. Jesus does what he sees the Father doing and He obediently joins in.

Are we making time to listen? I know we have so much to do; Jesus had so much he could do, Mary had so much to get ready, Simon needed to get home, a family to feed, but they all chose to listen. Will we give time to listen to Jesus, to pray, to read his word, and share what we hear with others in our small groups, our family, friends, colleagues, and neighbours?

Simon listens and he joins in. He starts with small steps and having lent his ears; he now offers his boat as a preaching platform. When Jesus finishes his preaching, he asks Simon to go a step even further – put out into deep water and let down your nets!

Simon's response is great: Read verse 5. Simon lets go of his pride, risking others laughing at him, and sets off. He listens and acts – he obeys Jesus.

What might we have to let go of and risk for Jesus? First, we must listen, but then we must act.



The result is a miraculous catch, such a super abundance that help is needed. Just think of the wealth here. Early retirement beckons, you can dine out on these fish and this fish story for years. But Simon sees beyond the miracle to the miracle maker. He recognises the wonder and glory of who Jesus is and the lack of goodness in himself. Jesus takes Simon, just as he invites us, and Simon does not settle for the trimmings, he is not satisfied with fish, when the whole buffet of abundant life is before him. Simon wants the whole thing that Jesus offers, he pulls the boat ashore, leaves it all behind and walks off with Jesus.

How many of us settle for the immediate, the obvious, the easy, when Jesus offers himself and a kingdom job? In the Sermon on the Mount mentioned earlier Jesus also said, 'Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it.' (Matthew 7:13-14)

Simon listens. He hears with his ears, his mind, and his heart; and he acts; in obedience he responds to the call of Jesus.

Apprentices listen – are we listening today? Genuinely hearing the voice of God in prayer and the Bible. Giving time and space for Jesus to speak.

And Apprentices act – are we acting obediently today.

It might take small steps, lending our ears and then our boats, but ultimately, like Simon, we want to be all-in, otherwise we risk missing out on all that God has for us. **Prayers:** Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. (Philippians 4:6)

- Pray for the nations, their leaders, and peoples pray for justice, mercy, peace, and hope.
- Pray for individuals, for neighbours, for family and friends

Collect for 13th after Trinity: Almighty God, whose only Son has opened for us a new and living way into your presence: give us pure hearts and steadfast wills to worship you in spirit and in truth; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen
