Read: Luke 1:67-80

The King is Announced. A summary of the talk given by Lorna Littlewood.

In Luke 1 we find Zechariah with an 8-day old son. It's been 400 years since anyone claims to have heard directly from God, 400 years of silence and 9 months Zechariah has spoken a word at all since he was visited by the angel Gabriel and learnt of his wife's miraculous pregnancy and the extraordinary role that his son would fulfil in the Kingdom of God.

ľm grateful to say I've not experienced a period as long as 400 years without hearing from God, but I expect I'm not alone in sometimes feeling like God has been on mute. We're coming up to Christmas and about the celebrate the joy of "God with us," and I have to remind myself that God is always with us and in us by his spirit – not just at Christmas. In seasons of what feels like silence, I must pursue God all the more... perhaps that's the point.

So, we find Zechariah and Elizabeth with their 8-day old son who is yet to be named. The assumption is that he will share his father's name, but this not the case. This child has already been named by God himself; "You are to give him the name John" the angel had said. It is only when Zechariah reaches for a writing tablet and indicates the name of his

child, that God opens his lips, and his restored. voice is Zechariah's response is to praise God, and in doing so he leads all the people around him to wonder at what God is doing here and who this child will be. These people have witnessed Zechariah's silence, and now they have witnessed his restoration. This has the fingerprints of God all over it and it's all everyone can talk about. John at this point is only 8 days old, but already, people have their expectations about his involvement in God's Kingdom.



"What part will this child grow up to play in the Kingdom of God?"

I think this can be a really powerful question to ask of any child, and I would encourage all of us to take an active role in praying for the children in our church, in our community and in our families.

John would grow up to point people to Jesus and to prepare the way for him. The truth is that all of us share in that purpose. We're currently in the lead up to remembering Jesus' birth over 2000 years ago, but we know that Jesus is coming again, and we share now in John's role of preparing the way for Him; pointing those around us to Him to share in the Kingdom he has invited us all to.

Zechariah knew that God was here, and he was involved. 400 years of silence was coming to a momentous crescendo in which God redeeming his people, fulfilling his promises, and bringing salvation to the whole world. I love that he speaks as though it has already happened. At this point, Jesus hasn't yet been born. Mary and Joseph probably haven't left Nazareth for Bethlehem vet. But Zechariah knows that God is greater than time itself, and the plan about to unfold before him has already been written in prophecies he's been reading his entire life.

The details haven't yet happened, but Zechariah knows that God has it all in hand and he is playing a role in God's plan "to rescue us from the hand of our enemies, and to enable us to serve him without fear in holiness and righteousness before him all our days."

So, in Jesus,

- God has rescued us
- He has enabled us to serve him without fear

- He has made us holy and righteous

Rescued us from what? From sin. From the impact of our selfishness which leads to separation from God and ultimately to death. In Jesus, God has taken our deserved punishment upon himself, swapping our sinful verdict with his righteous Because of this, we can approach God without fear. We are welcomed into his family and can stand before him clothed in his righteousness, not earned by us, but gifted by Jesus. As part of that family, God welcomes us to get involved in His Kingdom... and Zechariah's next words, although originally spoken specifically about John, now apply to us too.

Read Luke 1:76-79 aloud and hear them for yourself. Hear the calling of God on your life — the purpose he has for you as someone made righteous and clean by the blood of Christ...

God is not silent. He is here, now and he is interested and involved in each one of our lives; if we'll seek him with our whole heart, he promises that we will find him. God is not silent. He has saved us and offered us a place in his family and a chance to serve in his Kingdom. He is coming again, and he invites us, like John, to prepare the way.

Prayers: Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. (Philippians 4:4-6)
