The Sermon by Rev Howard Wright

Read Nehemiah 13:15-31, John 12.20-33 – Be Holy

We've reached the final in this Nehemiah series – today we're looking at the whole of this last chapter. We've jumped over some of the previous stories and I'd encourage you to read back over these.

We have seen how the Jews, led by Nehemiah, have rebuilt the walls and established themselves as God's people. Last time we had the renewing of their commitment to God, which they even signed.

Since then, after 12 years away, Nehemiah has returned back to his old job in Persia serving the king, but now he's back to see how it's all going, and the it's not going well. As Timothy pointed out last time, their commitment faltered – Entropy kicked in. We are in need of constant renewal. We want holiness as conferred by Jesus, we want salvation but without the daily work of the Spirit, we have no hope!

God wants us to live in the fulness of life that he has for us. He wants to bless us. But when we chose to live other than God's best, it risks harm to ourselves and others. Nothing satisfies the longings of the human heart, but God himself. As Augustine said, 'our hearts are restless until we find our rest in you God.'

God gives us guidance, instructions, and there's a risk to society, to family, and to ourselves, if we choose contrary to the manufactures instructions. Like trying to assemble flat-pack furniture with no regard to the instructions.

For Nehemiah, living God's best was non-negotiable. Compromise was not an option – God's holy 'laws' were not up for negotiation. God's laws, Nehemiah recognised, were for our best, like a 'sharp bend' road sign they steer us away from danger, and create safe places for all to live their truly best life.

Chapter 13 gives us four examples:

Firstly, be watchful of our hearts. Tobiah, a determined enemy of the wallbuilding project, had wheedled his way into the heart of the centre of worship. He was living in the temple! He was not a priest, and had never sought the well-being of the people of God.

If we are individually and collectively the 'city' today – what do we want at the heart of our lives as individually and communally? What values, hopes, and dreams do we want to govern us? What are we going to watch and listen to – do we want to grow whole and well, or do we want to risk our well-being?

Allowing Tobiah, an enemy in was a disaster! He undermined all that was good. If you're allergic to nuts, you're careful about not bringing nuts into your home Why would we allow things to pollute God's house, his temple, which is both us as individuals and together as the church? Be careful what you eat, but also what you watch, hear, and read. These might be toxic to our hearts.

Secondly there was a failure to be community. The people had stopped caring about each other and especially about the importance of worshipping together – they had stopped sharing their resources and enabling God's work to flourish.

We are not made for ourselves. We can only flourish with each other, and most importantly, together with God. This requires us to join-in; to serve and share the gifts, skills, abilities, and stuff, including money we have. In the earlier chapters there were a lists of names demonstrating the way in which all can be involved. Selfishness and hoarding never leads to joy! We are blessed to be a blessing and we are accountable to God for ourselves and all he's given us.

Thirdly the failure to be human beings and to trust!

We were made as human beings, not human doings. The very first thing God gives us to do in the creation story is, to rest! God challenges us to trust. The Sabbath is an indicator of our trust and reliance upon God – we're dispensable! The Sabbath is also a symbol of Heaven (see Hebrews 4:1-11). None of us are called to be lazy, but we're endanger of being slaves to doing, and God invites into joy, and rest – to be re-created! Slaving is dehumanising.

Fourthly, the failure to secure the future.

The people of God were to pass on the faith, to share the good news of God's love, with all, and especially with their families. Jews were not to risk their faith by marrying those who stuck with 'alternative views'. Nehemiah discovers that the children can't even read or access the news of God, because they don't have the language.

Today is a baptism, and this is challenge for N's parents, but is a challenge for those of us individuals who have influence over children, but also for us as a congregation. In just one generation the knowledge of God could disappear. Hence need for Youth and Children's minister.

So, are you going to look after your heart. To be careful to feast on healthy things, to be committed to community, to seek by God's grace to be fully human, and to pass on the Good News.

Take time to pray thanking god for all he's given you, and commit to him again.
